Executive Summary

The proposed project was designed with a primary focus on improving the lives of tribal communities in the Kolli Hills of Namakkal District, specifically targeting disadvantaged youths and women across 10 village panchayats. The project aimed to provide skill training, enhance employability, and enable the initiation of value-added food product units using native fruits for sustainable income generation.

The initiatives sought to address the pressing issues of unemployment, malnutrition, and lack of safe drinking water prevalent among the tribal population.

Project Objectives and Scope:

The project's specific objectives were:

To provide skill training to 300 disadvantaged youths and women for gaining trade and employable skills.

To enable access to viable livelihood sources or job placements for 300 disadvantaged youths and women, thereby improving their living standards.

The project included three main skill training courses: Tailoring and Embroidery, Desktop Publication (DTP) and Tally Accounting, and Value-added Food Product Processing using native fruits like pineapple, jackfruit, and pepper.

Project Outcomes and Impacts:

The project successfully achieved the following outcomes:

Around 80 youths gained tailoring and embroidery skills, with 90% obtaining employment opportunities and 10% initiating self-employment ventures.

Approximately 60 youths acquired computer application skills, with 75% securing local employment and 25% starting their livelihood ventures.

Nearly 60 youths gained pickle-making skills, with at least 20 of them placed in employment and 40 initiating collective or self-employment ventures.

The targeted youth significantly improved their livelihood resources and living standards, indirectly enhancing the socio-economic conditions of their families.

Project Implementation and Activities:

The project was implemented through a series of activities including regular theory and practical classes for skill improvement, placement in garment units, linking with government schemes and local banks for self-employment initiation, and periodical monitoring and financial support for self-employment units.

COVID-19 Pandemic Standard Protocols:

During the project implementation, adherence to COVID-19 pandemic standard protocols was maintained to ensure the safety and well-being of all involved. Protocols included hand hygiene, physical distancing, mask-wearing, and encouraging vaccination against COVID-19.

Recommendations and Future Prospects:

To sustain the positive impacts achieved by this project, it is recommended to continue similar initiatives and expand the reach to more tribal communities in need. **To achieve this project and bring paradigm shift, we need your benevolent support up to 2025. It could further amplify the project's success.**

Successful Launch of TAILORING TRAINING Program in Thembalam Village, Kollihills, Namakkal District, Tamilnadu.

After extensive discussions and consultations with girls, their parents, local Panchayat members, and village authorities in Thembalam, located in the Kollihills of Namakkal district, a decision was reached to initiate a tailoring training program. This decision was made in response to the high demand for such training among girls in the village. To facilitate this endeavor, a full-time trainer was hired, and arrangements were made for six stitching machines.

Inauguration and Support:



The opening of the training facility in Thembalam Village was graced by the presence of the Regional Manager of Finolex Pipes, who officiated the inauguration. The event saw the participation of esteemed guests, including the Panchayat President, CRD representatives, and beneficiaries. During the ceremony, all guests offered inspiring words of encouragement to the young women, highlighting the economic opportunities that awaited them.

Community Support:

The local Panchayat President, deeply committed to women's empowerment, pledged to send women from the hamlet to enroll in the sewing training program. True to his word, he actively facilitated the enrollment of numerous local women in our training facilities.

Beneficiary Progress:

Our tailoring program has made a significant impact on the lives of women in the community. Many uneducated women eagerly joined our training center, and the success of our first batch students encouraged even more participants in subsequent batches.

Trainee Registration:

The registration of trainees was carried out voluntarily by village leaders, and a comprehensive list of 60 girls for each batch was meticulously prepared and subsequently submitted to the Community Resource Development (CRD) coordinator.

Training Structure:

After thorough consultations with the CRD representative, a meeting was organized for all the registered girls. During this meeting, it was collectively decided that, due to the significant level of interest and participation, the

training program would be divided into two batches, each consisting of 30 girls. The training sessions would be conducted from 10:00 AM to 5:30 PM daily.

Our tailoring program has made a significant impact on the lives of women in the community. Many uneducated women eagerly joined our training center, and the success of our first batch students encouraged even more participants in subsequent batches.

34 women have purchased sewing machines and started sewing clothes, earning between Rs. 3,000/- to Rs. 5,000/- per month.

4 women are working in tailoring shops, earning Rs. 3,500/- per month.

6 women are employed in garment-making, earning Rs. 8,500/- per month.

Scope of Our Center

Our CRD Center is committed to providing educational opportunities for young individuals living below the poverty line (BPL). One common hurdle faced by these educated but unemployed youth is the lack of computer literacy, limiting their career prospects. Our center addresses this critical issue by offering courses in Desktop Publishing (DTP) and Tally Accounting, providing them with essential computer skills to enhance their employability.

Introduction of DTP and Tally Accounting Courses

In tandem with the inauguration of our successful tailoring center in Thembalam, we introduced a Computer Center on the same day. This initiative has proven to be highly beneficial for our young community members. While many of them attend educational institutions, they often lack the opportunity or time to receive computer education. Our center fills this gap by providing accessible and valuable computer skills training.

Our participants receive comprehensive training in the following areas

DTP (Desktop Publishing) Adobe Photoshop, Corel Draw

Publishing work, Layouting, Adobe InDesign, Visual Grammar

Tally Accounting, Handling multiple currencies, Mastering cashbook, Ledger maintenance Bill-wise debtors and creditors ledger, Payment vouchers, Daybook in Tally, Interest calculations

Bank reconciliation, Bill-wise and batch-wise details, Contra and journal vouchers, Job costing, Payroll VAT, CST, GST, and more

However, the computer education provided at our center exceeded their expectations, equipping them with the skills needed to enhance their career prospects.

The Desktop Publishing (DTP) and Tally Accounting courses have opened doors of opportunity for the youth in Kollihills, bridging the gap between education and employability, and empowering them to build brighter futures.

It was through these efforts that Mr. Kamaraj learned about our free computer education center and decided to join as the first candidate.

In Kollihills, where there were no E-Service Centers, Mr. Kamaraj quickly grasped computer education, eager to compare his progress with that of his peers. His determination and dedication to learning were commendable, and he became a shining example for others in his community.

Family Support

As the first graduate in his family, Mr. Kamaraj's achievements were a source of immense pride. His family, which had faced its share of challenges, found hope in his pursuit of computer education. Mr. Kamaraj's father had passed away when he was just 12 years old, leaving his mother, Mrs. Jayamani, to support the family. Mrs. Jayamani had been married at a young age, reflecting a prevalent issue of child marriages in Kollihills. She

worked in agriculture and used her hard-earned income to support her son's education, although she worried about his future job prospects.

Empowerment through Education

Upon completing his computer education at our center, Mr. Kamaraj realized his dream of establishing the E-Service center with DTP services. Our project coordinator played a crucial role in assisting him in securing a bank loan to set up the facility. Today, Mr. Kamaraj's center generates a monthly income of Rs. 15,000/-. He diligently repays the bank loan each month, showcasing his commitment and responsibility.

Mr. Kamaraj's inspiring journey serves as a testament to the transformative power of education and community support. Through our center's efforts, he not only gained the skills needed to launch his E-Service center but also contributed to economic development in his community, breaking barriers and building a brighter future for himself and his family.

VALUE ADDED JACK FRUIT TRAINING

Added Jackfruit Training Completion Report

Introduction

The Value-Added Jackfruit Training program was an initiative designed to empower youth with valuable skills in food processing and entrepreneurship. Under the guidance of a dedicated instructor, this comprehensive program aimed to enhance the employability and entrepreneurial potential of young individuals in the community. The training spanned across three batches, with each batch lasting for four months and accommodating 30 trainees.

Value-Addition of Jackfruit

The program focused on various value-added products that can be produced from jackfruit. These included:

Dried jackfruit flakes, Preserved jackfruit bulbs, dehydrated jackfruit bulbs

Jackfruit Squash, Jackfruit Nectar, Jackfruit Wine, Jackfruit Vinegar

Canned jackfruit products, Candied jackfruit, Jackfruit bar & ice cream

Jackfruit Pickles, Jackfruit Chips, Jackfruit Papad, Jackfruit Sweets

Jackfruit Seed Flour, Roasted Nuts

Value-Addition of Pineapple:

Additionally, the program also covered value-added products from pineapple, such as Pineapple jam, Pineapple Candy, Pineapple juice, and Vinegar from Pineapple. The training emphasized that these trades were highly suitable for both individual and collective ventures, with a preference for the latter among most youths. These value-added food products were not only in high demand in local markets but also had the potential for sales at the district and state levels.

Skills Development and Employment:

Throughout the program, approximately 60 youths acquired valuable skills in pickle making and food processing. They developed competencies that made them more employable in the food industry. Out of these, a minimum of 20 youths successfully secured employment, while 40 of them embarked on collective or self-employment ventures. This marked a significant step towards fostering entrepreneurship in the community and addressing unemployment issues.

Impact and Future Prospects:

The Value-Added Jackfruit Training program has had a profound impact on the lives of the youth involved. It not only equipped them with practical skills but also instilled in them a spirit of entrepreneurship. As these trained individuals move forward, they are expected to contribute to the growth of the local economy by producing high-quality, locally-sourced value-added food products. Furthermore, the program's emphasis on collective ventures fosters cooperation and teamwork, enhancing the potential for success.

CHALLENGES

Challenges of Value-Added Jackfruit Training:
