

Beyond Education: Finolex Industries Limited Pioneers Sustainable Skill Development in Rural Odisha

Korapada, 01.09.2023: In a collaborative effort of skill and potential, Finolex Industries Limited (FIL), its long-standing CSR partner Muktik Mandal (MMT), and Action Aid India joined together to fuel a transformative education journey, ensuring 47 students successfully completed their plumbing training program at FIL Panamundai.

The event marked a significant milestone in a decade-long partnership between Finolex and MMT, highlighting their commitment to creating sustainable and equitable opportunities.

Action Aid India, a renowned international development organization, has been instrumental in amplifying the social impact of this program. Through their

collaborative grassroots approach, the partnership has created a robust ecosystem for skill development and economic empowerment in rural Odisha.

Sumit Bhattacharya, Vice President of Marketing & Communications at Finolex, eloquently expressed the essence of their mission: "Plumbing is more than a technical skill—it's a gateway to entrepreneurship and economic independence. We're not just training individuals, we're creating micro-entrepreneurs who can transform their local economies."

The plumbing program represents a strategic intervention in a sector with significant entrepreneurial potential. By providing comprehensive training that goes beyond technical skills to include business fundamentals, Finolex is

empowering a new generation of skilled entrepreneurs. Graduates are equipped not just with plumbing expertise, but with the knowledge to start their own businesses, secure employment in diverse sectors, or buyout valuable assets. In turn, it drives local job creation, infrastructure, and business improvement industries.

The collaborative project between FIL, MMT, and Action Aid has created meaningful opportunities in Korapada, impacting 72 women entrepreneurs across 10 villages. The project's impact is tangible: 447 families connected to social security schemes, 360 youth provided with skill development and job opportunities, and 10 women's collectives established with 263 members.
